
We are proud that Garden Academy was one of the very first schools in the state of New Jersey to welcome students to in-school instruction.


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Lives changed while enrolled at Garden Academy

Since then, we've been busy doing all of the things that make our program so unique: teaching our students to communicate their wants and needs, running feeding and medical tolerance programs, teaching essential self-help skills, and helping our students develop important vocational skills.

All year long, we've been helping our students meet and exceed their goals—helping students like Alex who learned to build furniture for younger classmates to use.





As in any year, our students worked hard and blew us away with their many successes! As we reflect on this past year, we wanted to highlight our students' accomplishments during the 2020-21 school year.

• A student in Classroom A was able to move away from being on a puree-only diet and can now independently eat a number of foods across various food groups!

• A student in Classroom A2 mastered all of her letters and letter sounds this year!

• A student in Classroom B learned how to trace lines and shapes.

• A student in Classroom C learned how to sort silverware, apply deoderant, and wash his face!

Earlier this year, we shared about Tommy's triumphs in building independence and vocational skills. Since then, Tommy had another great accomplishment he achieved just weeks before he walked across the stage at his graduation.

Right after we published Tommy's story, staff at Garden Academy arranged for a mobile blood draw unit to come to the school for interested families whose students participated in medical tolerance programs. Tommy worked hard all year on tolerating mock blood draws at school with his classroom staff, and this was an opportunity to put his hard work to the test.

When the time came for Tommy to get his blood drawn, he was able to get it done like a champ! With his team by his side and his favorite music on, he barely flinched as the nurse took his blood. We are so incredibly proud of Tommy and can't wait to see what he does next. What a way to end his Garden Academy career!

Creating an all-virtual program for children with autism required a fair amount of two things: imagination and technology. When we

received the news of COVID-19 closing schools, our team sprung into action to develop individualized plans for each of our students during the time schools would be closed. Over the course of our 6 months in virtual instruction, we further adapted to this new way of educating students by supplying all of our staff and families with dedicated Chromebooks and iPads. We provided several staff and families who did not have access to high-speed ernet with WiFi hotspots that allowed for video conferencing, as well

internet with WiFi hotspots that allowed for video conferencing, as well as a portable camera to help staff conduct virtual sessions in locations that were more difficult to bring computers to, such as hygiene programs.

When we returned to school, our need for technology continued as we contemplated how to best socially distance in our snug building. We purchased 55 walkie talkies to allow for communication between classrooms while maintaining our pods. Our use of technology during COVID-19 has allowed us to keep our students and staff safe and healthy while in school, and that's absolutely priceless.

We are proud that Garden Academy was among some of the first schools in New Jersey to return to inperson instruction in September 2020. After welcoming our students back, our next priority was re-introducing essential programs that were on hold such as feeding, hygiene, and medical tolerance. These programs play a big role in our students living independent and healthy lives, so our team created a plan of action to get these programs back into place safely.

Equipped with electrostatic foggers, disinfectant wipes, and lots of personal protective equipment, our team created personalized plans to support each students' unique needs to bring these programs back into practice. Since then, we've seen success after success in these areas, **including a student who previously ate a puree-only diet now eating foods from every food group!**



Although COVID-19 brought its setbacks, we ensured that our students had fun throughout the year too. One aspect of our mission is to train qualified, skilled professional in the field of behavior analysis. One way our Clinical Leadership team trains professionals is through Garden Academy's comprehensive supervision program for staff who are seeking their Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) certification. Our supervision process goes beyond training staff in the principles of behavior analysis to include training on decision making, problem solving, and managerial and interpersonal skills.

Supervision at Garden Academy consists of two parts: individual supervision from a BCBA supervisor and group supervision.

Our individual supervision consists of

observations, the implementation

of clinical tasks, and regular one-to-one meetings to discuss feedback. Group supervision allows our participants to conduct article reviews and case presentations, all furthering their behavior analytic skills.

The research published by our leadership team and staff members has a direct impact on the instruction we provide each day at Garden Academy. In this past school year, three staff members—Dr. Laura Grow, Dr. Danielle Gureghian, and Samantha Breeman, BCBA—published research comparing various educational interventions to assess which one was the most effective for learners with autism. This essential research in turn informs the way our sessions at school are structured to allow our students to learn efficiently, with fewer errors, and with less challenging behavior to make school the most positive and effective learning environment possible. Their research was also shared to the broader autism and behavior analysis community through publication and conference presentations, helping people with autism locally, nationally, and internationally.

Another topic of research published by Garden Academy staff Taylor Custer, BCBA involved promoting conversational skills among adults with autism. This research helped to inform social skills programs with our older learners, allowing them to not only practice positive social skills with their teachers and peers, but in the community at their Work-Based Learning job sites.
